The seedlings come in a variety of sizes. They are adaptable to a wide variety of environmental conditions in our area. The stock is all "Grade A" quality and is packaged to ensure the best possible pre-planting conditions. Because we have no control over the handling of plants after distribution to customers, *we cannot guarantee the survival of the stock after planting.*

OUR TREE PROGRAM

The profits from this program go back to our conservation districts which addresses locally led conservation projects and issues in our communities and watersheds.

WHY PLANT TREES?

- Habitat for a large variety of wildlife.
- Yield of fields with windbreaks are significantly higher than those without windbreaks.
- Trees prevent or reduce water pollution and recharge ground water.
- Reduction of soil erosion.
- Reduction in energy costs.
- Beauty

DECIDUOUS TREES

Quaking Aspen: a deciduous tree native to cooler areas of North America, with smooth pale bark, scarred with black. Green leaves become golden to yellow, rarely red, in autumn. Mature crown height 60'-80'

Cottonless Cottonwood (male): Cottonwood is a rapid growing tree and becomes very large with age . It has a spread of 50-75' and 50-80' in height. Yellow fall color.

Siouxland Poplar : A fast growing poplar that is taller and more rounded than the Simon Poplar. Tolerates alkalinity and is drought resistant. Makes a good windbreak. Mature crown height 60'-80'. Yellow fall color

Bur Oak: Produces heavy crops of acorns. The bur oak grows well in acidic, alkaline, loamy, sandy, well-drained, wet and clay soils. While it prefers moderate moisture, the tree has some drought tolerance. The bur oak grows to a height of 70-80' and a spread of around 80' at maturity.

CONIFERS

White Pine: A hardy, valuable tree. Clustered soft blue-green needles. Ideal screen or windbreak. Likes moist, well-drained soils. Grows 50' to 80' with a 20-40' spread in the landscape, up to 135' or more in the wild .

Colorado Blue Spruce: The official state tree of Utah, the blue spruce is adapted to alkaline soils. More drought tolerant than other spruces, the dense foliage makes a good windbreak. Mature height 65', mature width 15-25'.

SHRUBS

Chokecherry: A small tree/shrub that is native to Utah's stream bottoms. Fruit is very attractive to wildlife. Deer and other animals browse the young shoots. Mature height 12'-25', Width 10'-20'

Sand Cherry: This is a very hardy flowering landscape specimen with reddish-purple foliage that keeps its unique color all summer. Because of this, the purpleleaf sand cherry makes an excellent contrast tree. It can be planted close to paved surfaces and near utility lines and can also be used as a deciduous hedge. Grows to a height of 7-10' and a spread of 5-7' at maturity.

Golden Current: A native shrub with attractive yellow flowers in the spring. The fruit is relished by birds and wildlife. Has brilliant red and orange fall color. Mature height 3'-6', Width 3'-6'.

Common Lilac: A very common, large shrub that is cold hardy and drought tolerant once established. Produces fragrant purple flowers in the spring. Mature height 12'-25', Width 10'-20'

Red Osier Dogwood: An open, spreading, multi-stemmed shrub. Has white flowers in summer and attractive bright red stems in the winter. Birds and big game utilize Dogwood for food and cover. Mature height 7'-10', Width 10-15'

False Indigo: False Indigo bush is somewhat leggy shrub, whose height can range from 6 to 20' tall and 5 to 15' wide. Fragrant foilage has compound pinnate leaves. Flowers are 1/3" wide, purple-blue with orange anthers. Fruit is a kidney shaped pod. This bush attracts butterflies.
