UACD in an agreement with NRCS hired a Partnership Director. This position, accepted by Joshua Palmer, will work with our various conservation partner organizations to coordinate training of conservation employees and other conservation efforts throughout the State. We welcome Josh to the team!

UACD with partners Utah Department of Ag & Food and USU Extension, received a \$1.7 million, 5 years grant to do on-farm soil health trials on 12 sites. USHN project utilizes on-farm trail sites focused on diverse farming systems throughout the state to provide for demonstration, outreach, education and research on soil health systems specific to our state and region. We leverage partnerships with federal and state agencies, USU extension, agriculture industry / crop advisors, to create cross training, educational materials and focused support for field advisors / planners, that will in turn provide greater support and communication for producers in the state.

USHN goal is to increase adoption of soil health best practices to promote climate resiliency in Utah where adoption rates are among the lowest in the nation. Needs assessments will be conducted at the establishment of each on-farm trial.

Land owners will receive incentive payments to participate from \$3,000 - \$6,000 per year of participation. Applications to participate will be available in January.

Soil Health in the West Conference and Beginners Workshop

Soil health, cover crops, no-till, regenerative agriculture, composting, livestock integration, and nutrient cycling. These are just a few terms floating around agriculture nowadays. With operating costs increasing, markets becoming more volatile, droughts, floods and an assortment of unpredictable weather, farmers and ranchers are looking for ways to ease the burden on their operations. How can the principles of soil health help?

The event includes an optional Beginner Workshop on Feb 15th, for those just starting to get into soil health. This workshop will include a field day with multiple hands on demonstrations to learn about the principles of soil health, how to evaluate the health of your soil, and how to get started into soil health practices like no-till and cover crops.

Following the Beginners Workshop, the Conference will include two days of learning opportunities with presentations from national experts, as well as farmers and ranchers from around the region. The workshops will include 12 unique breakout sessions, a vendor fair and networking social, and lunches will be provided with registration. Presentations will cover a broad range of soil health topics and will include farmers and ranchers from around the region as they share their personal journeys down the soil health road. Producer presentations will include dairy operations, dryland farms, irrigated row crop systems, cow calf operations, small scale and specialty crops, and more.
